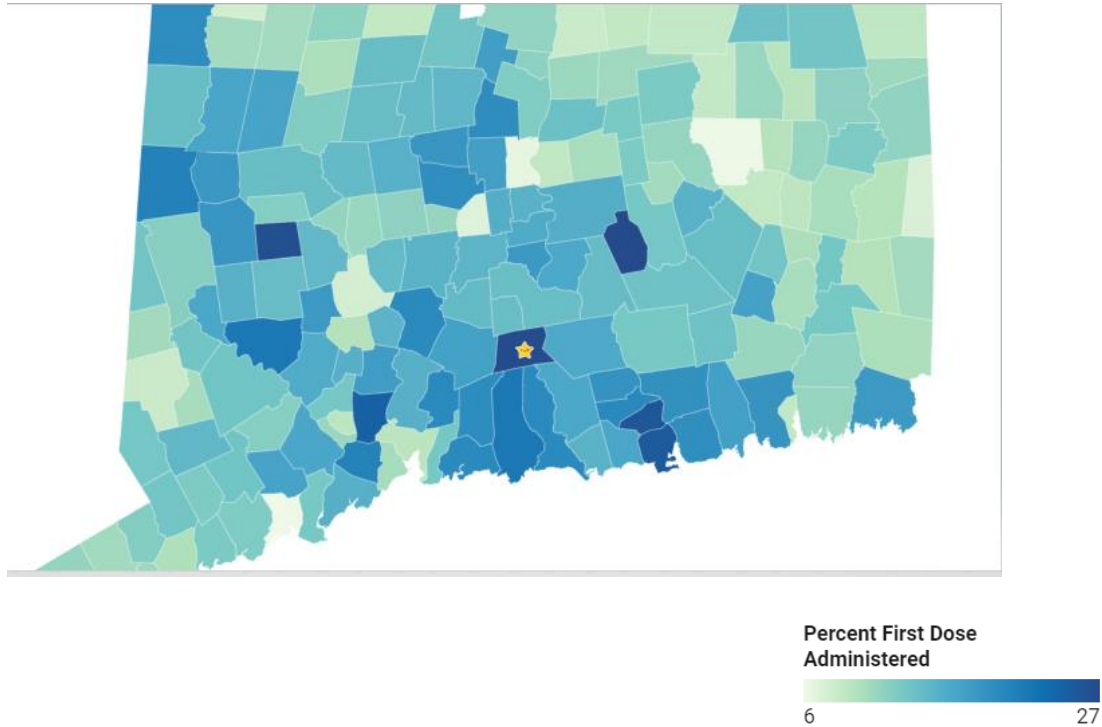


## COVID-19 Weekly Summary – Town of Durham 2/19/2021

According to the State of Connecticut, over 70% of Durham’s 75 and older population has received at least a first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine and 26.73% of Durham’s total population has been vaccinated. 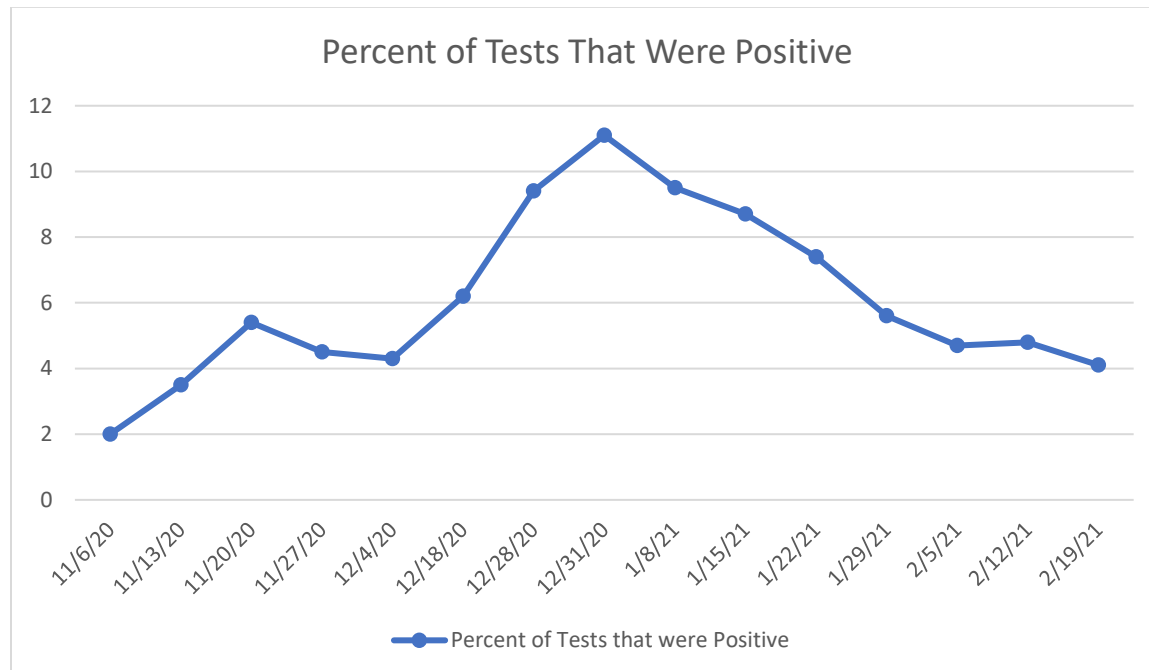

**Percent of Tests that were Positive: Durham = 4.1% (-.7% from 4.8%)**

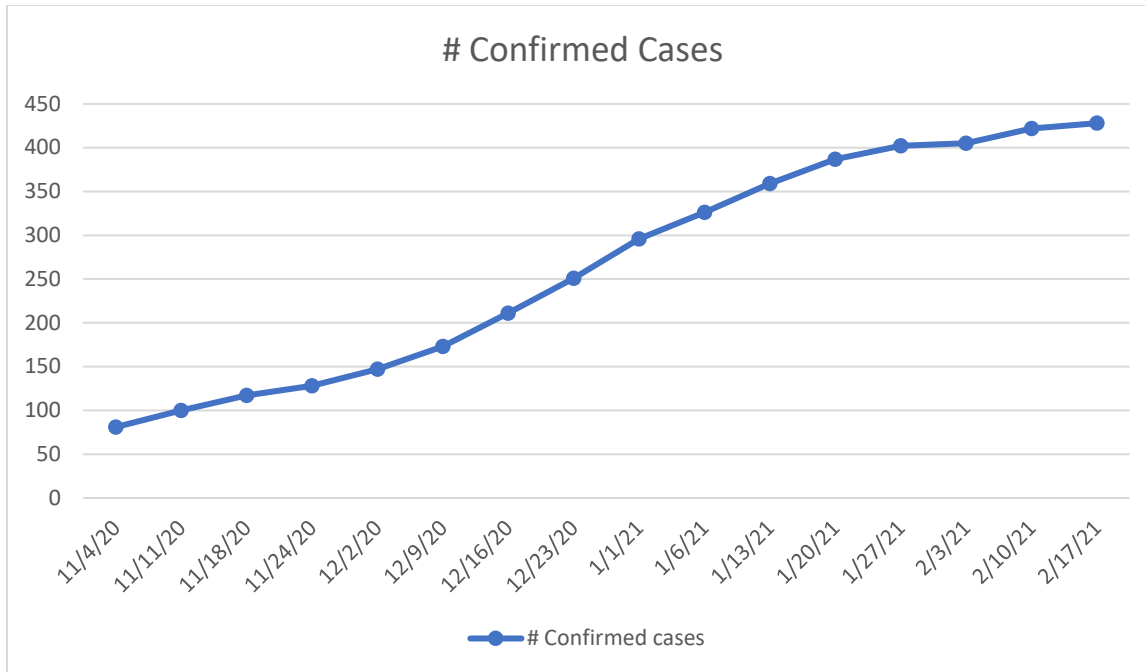

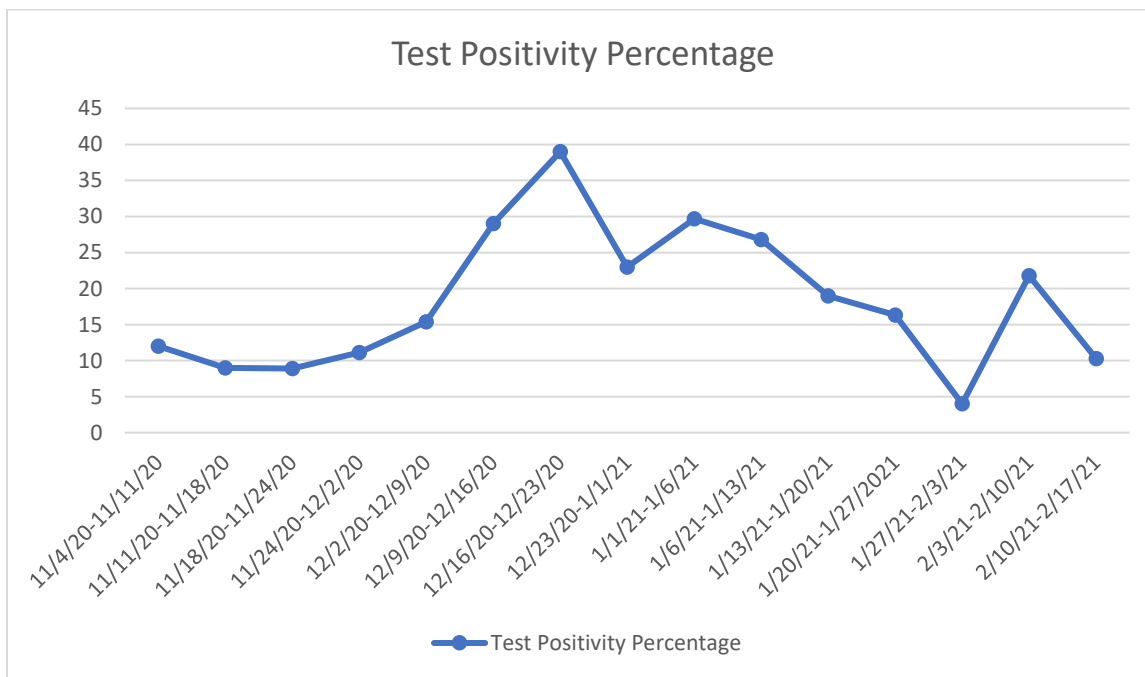

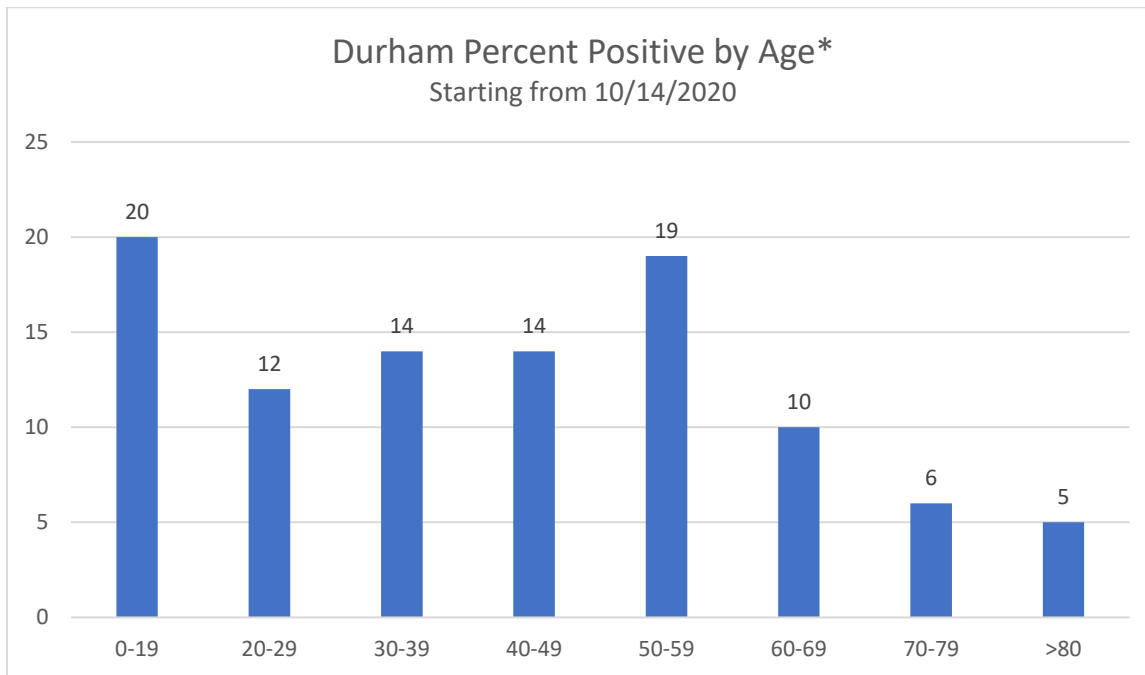

**Vaccinations**

**COVID-19 Vaccine Phase 1B: Age 65-74 Roll Out**

Individuals between the ages of 65 and 74 can now begin scheduling in VAMS and are now eligible to receive the vaccine. Please note that some clinics may still prioritize those eligible for phase 1A and those aged 75 and older.

**Registering and Scheduling Options:**

- **You may schedule through certain health care facilities or pharmacies such as CVS, Walgreens, and Walmart and other options found here:**

- **Connecticut's Vaccine Administration Management System (VAMS) Online:** A form can be accessed online at  
<https://vams.cdc.gov/vaccineportal/s/login/?ec=302&startURL=%2Fvaccineportal%2Fs%2F> that allows individuals to schedule an appointment through the web-based system. This system is used by a wide range of providers and local health districts and will allow you to find locations closest to you.
- **For those without internet access: You may call Connecticut's COVID-19 Vaccine Appointment Assistant Line at 877-918-2224.** This phone system was created through a partnership between the Department of Public Health and United Way of Connecticut and is specifically targeted to provide support for eligible vaccine recipients who have limited technology access or who have language, disability, or other barriers that could prevent them from using existing self-scheduling options successfully. The line will take calls Monday through Friday from 8:00AM to 8:00PM.
- **You may hear directly from your health care provider.**
- **Durham residents, age 65 and older or Durham residents eligible for Phase 1A** may visit the Durham Recreation RecDesk page:  
<https://durhamct.recdesk.com/Community/Program/Detail?programId=392> to sign up for the tentative waiting list for vaccination clinics. Please note that our clinics are based on vaccine availability. Clinics are confirmed on a week-to-week basis. Once we receive confirmation, we start from where we left off on the list and work our way down until all appointments are filled for that clinic. If we are able to schedule you, we will call you, provide you a time to come in, and complete the paperwork over the phone. Please let us know if you schedule elsewhere.

**Patience, Patience, Patience:** There are limited appointments and limited vaccinations at this time. Please be patient with the system.

### **More Information & Executive Orders**

- Executive Order 9N was issued 11/26/2020. This increases fines for businesses from \$500 to \$10,000 per violation. <https://portal.ct.gov/-/media/Office-of-the-Governor/Executive-Orders/Lamont-Executive-Orders/Executive-Order-No-9N.pdf>
- Starting November 6, Connecticut rolled back into phase 2.1. Rules and regulations can be found here: <https://portal.ct.gov/DECD/Content/Coronavirus-Business-Recovery/Sector-Rules-and-Certification-for-Reopen>. Some of the changes include reducing seating capacity at restaurants by 50%, closing restaurants and entertainment venues by 9:30 PM (not including take out or delivery services), and limiting indoor events to 25 people and outdoor events to 50 people. - Extension of COVID-19 executive orders
- Extension of agency and municipal emergency orders
- Extension of eviction moratorium
- Effective dates for protection from civil liability for actions of omissions in support of the state's COVID-19 response
- Extension until March 1, 2021 of certain provisions related to court operations and associated requirements

February 4, 2021: [\*\*Executive Order No. 10\*\*](#)

- Exclusion of individual stimulus payments from benefit eligibility calculations
- Suspension of reapplication filing requirement for the additional veterans tax relief program
- Suspension of reapplication filing requirement for the Homeowners' – Elderly/Disabled Circuit Breaker and Freeze Tax Relief Programs
- Use of commuter parking facilities as needed for COVID-19 testing and vaccination
- Renewals of liquor permits extended
- Paid leave requirements for staff of local and regional boards of education
- Relaxation of limits on religious gatherings
- Absentee voting eligibility during COVID-19 pandemic
