

COVID-19 Weekly Summary – Town of Durham 5/7/2021

According to the State of Connecticut, 60% of Durham's total population has received at least one dose of the vaccine and 48% of Durham's total population is fully vaccinated. Within the 16-44 age group, 55% have received at least a first dose of the vaccine and 34% are fully vaccinated. Within the 45-65 age group, 70% have received at least a first dose of the vaccine and 59% are fully vaccinated. One is considered fully vaccinated two weeks after the second dose of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine or two weeks after the one dose of the Johnson & Johnson's Jansenn vaccine. Fully vaccinated individuals **should continue** to:

- Wear a mask while indoors in public places
- Wear a mask when indoors with unvaccinated people who are at increased risk for severe COVID-19 disease or who have an unvaccinated household member who is at increased risk for severe COVID-19 disease
- Wear a mask when visiting indoors with unvaccinated people from multiple households
- Avoid indoor large-sized, in-person gatherings
- Get tested if having COVID-19 symptoms
- Follow rules and guidance issued by employers and businesses
- Follow CDC and health department travel requirements and recommendations

All should continue mask wearing, hand washing, staying at least 6 feet away from others, and avoiding crowds and poorly ventilated areas. For fully vaccinated people, there are some exceptions depending on the situation. Keep up the good work with those preventative measures! If we all do our part, we can protect each other.

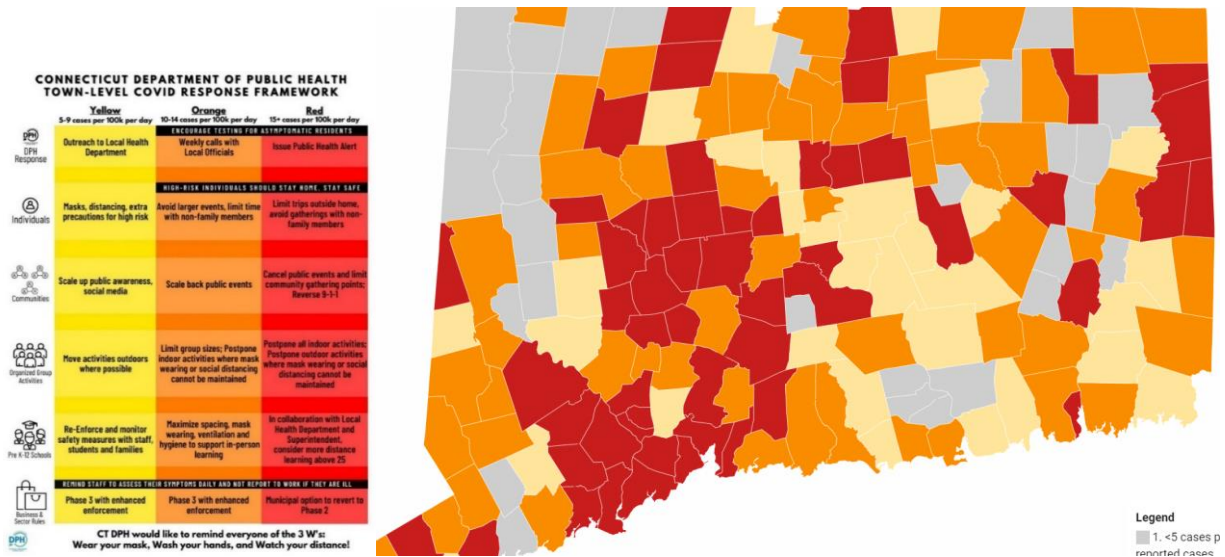
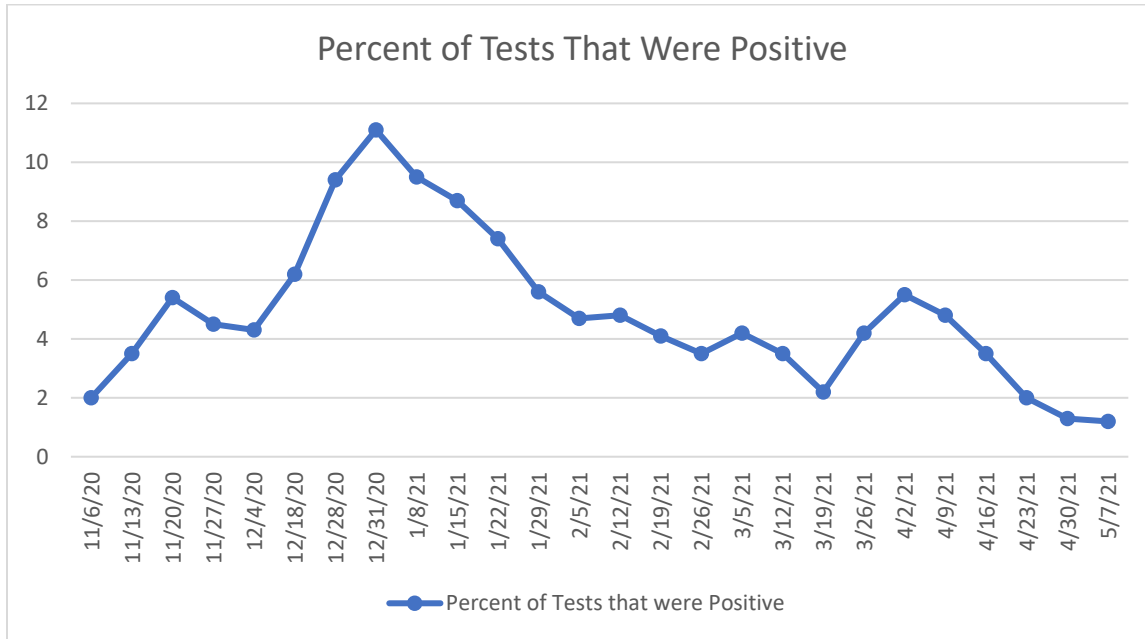

Percent of Tests that were Positive: Durham = 1.2% (-.1 from 1.3%)

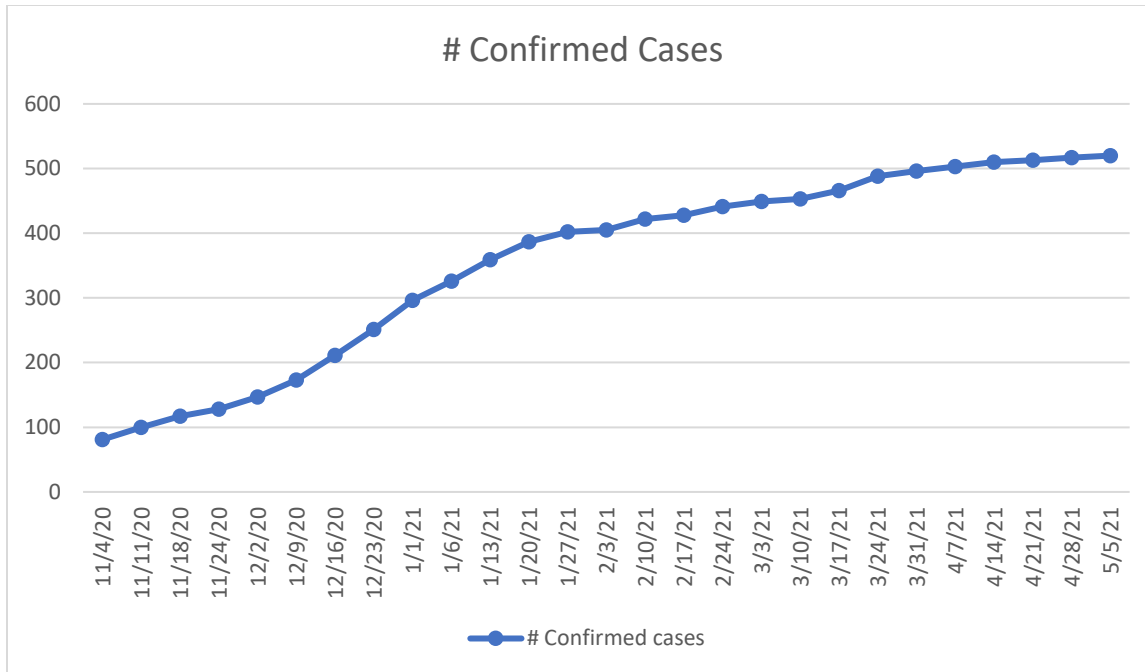

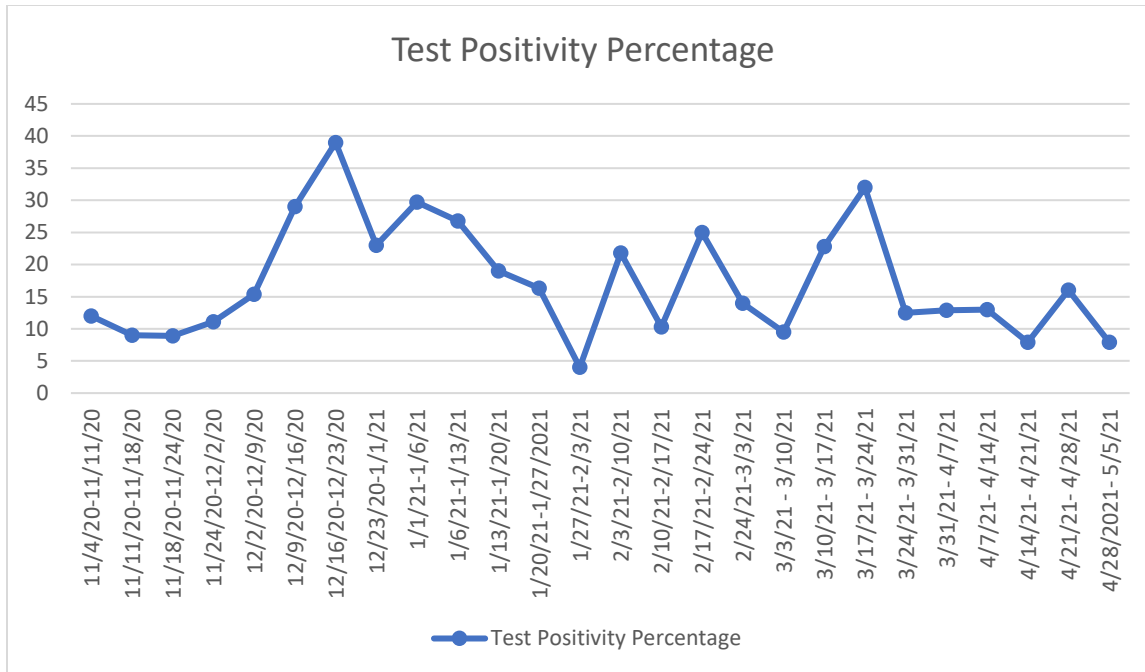

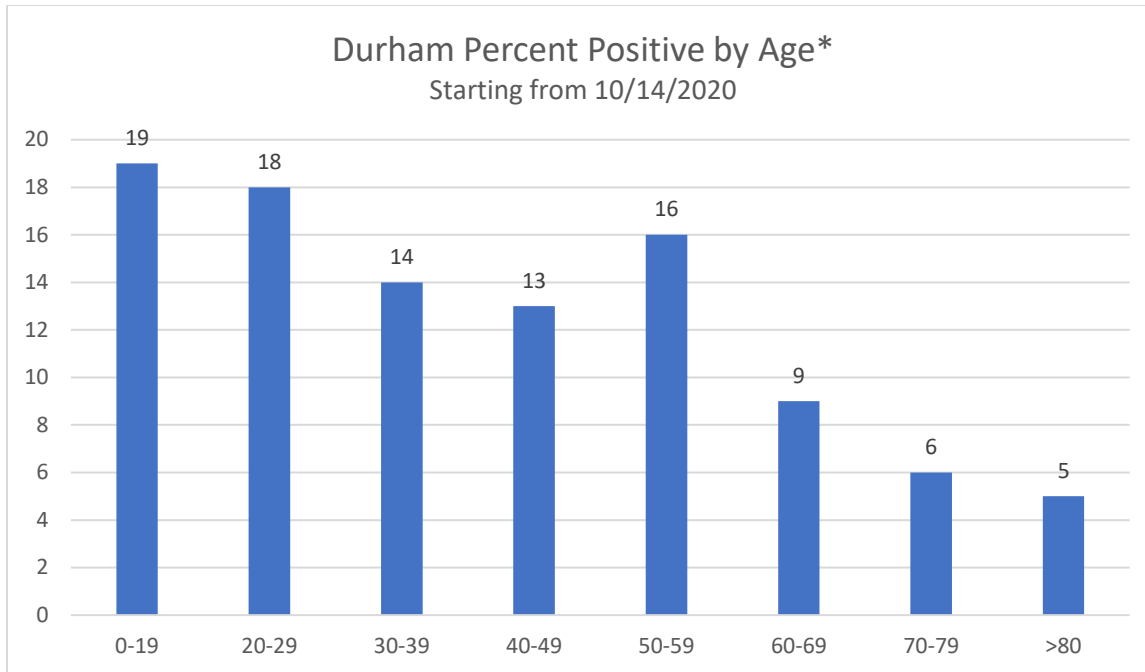

COVID Vaccine Eligibility

- All Connecticut residents age 16 or older can make an appointment for the COVID-19 vaccine.

How to Get the Vaccine

 - Available 8:00am to 8:00pm EST, 7 days a week
- Connecticut’s Vaccine Administration Management System (VAMS) Online: A form can be accessed online at <https://dphsubmissions.ct.gov/onlinevaccine> to register or <https://vams.cdc.gov/vaccineportal/s/login/?ec=302&startURL=%2Fvaccineportal%2Fs%2F> to login and find more information that allows individuals to schedule an appointment through the web-based system. This system is used by a wide range of providers and local health districts and will allow you to find locations closest to you.

- Extension of authority for DMV to issue duplicate driver's licenses and identification credentials remotely
- Permits service of alcohol outdoors without requiring that drinks be served with food

April 20, 2021: [**Executive Order No. 11E**](#)

- Extends to May 20 executive orders that have been identified as critical to pandemic response and recovery

- Consolidates and renews contracting flexibility to procure essential goods, services, and real estate to respond to the pandemic

- Consolidates and renews authority for relevant agency heads to restrict visitation at congregate facilities in order to limit the risk of transmission of COVID-19

- Consolidates and renews sector rules and related enforcement authority so that the Department of Economic and Community Development can continue to issue changes to these rules as the circumstances evolve and vaccination rates increase

- Extends to May 20 various executive orders that have been identified as critical to pandemic response and recovery, except for those covered by Executive Orders No. 11A through 11D
